


2022-23 Survey (Baseline)



The UC Basic Needs Research & Evaluation team administered an online survey to all students who accessed Basic Needs services during Fall 2022, at nine participating University of California campuses. Survey respondents provided feedback on the utilization of Basic Needs services offered on their campus, as well information regarding their housing status, food security, financial security and mental health, in the last three months. The following is an infographic report on parenting students (79/1606) who made up 5% of respondents.




